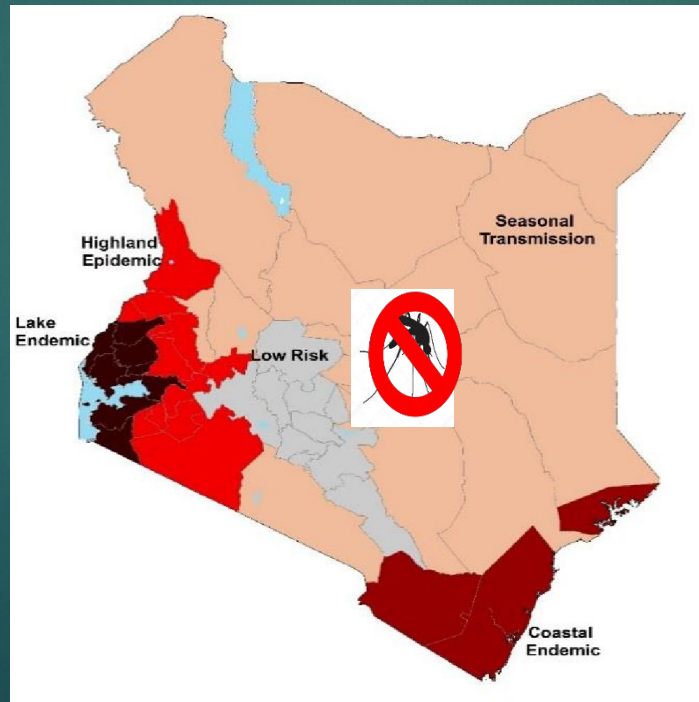

 - Main activity is advocacy around court case that stopped CHVS from carrying out community malaria testing
- **Artificial intelligence-** advocacy for the adoption of artificial intelligence in health management information systems (HMIS)
